

JUVENILE INNOCENCE & FAIR SENTENCING CLINIC FAST FACTS

- Type: Criminal Defense
- Area: Post-conviction
- What does that mean?
 - Juvenile lifer resentencing
 - Felony Murder resentencing
 - **o** Mitigation hearings
 - **o** Wrongful conviction
 - Parole hearings
 - Client contact in person, on phone, in prison
 - Lots of written and oral advocacy
 - Lots of time in court
- Commitment: Full academic year
- Units: 11 UNITS TOTAL
 - 5 units graded (3 fall, 2 spring)
 - 6 units ungraded (2 fall, 4 spring)
- All JIFS students are certified!
 - This means you are allowed to draft motions and petitions, and represent your client in court.
 - You are supervised at all times by an experienced attorney, so you never have to do this alone.



- How is JIFS different from other clinics?
 - The JIFS Clinic focuses solely on mass incarceration of youth.
 - Most of our clients are not innocent. They are oversentenced and overincarcerated.
 - The JIFS Clinic is a writing clinic. You will do more writing here than any other clinic. We also do better writing than any other clinic – and better than most law firms.
 - You will defend your client and your work product in court.
 - You will have a lot of contact with incarcerated clients.
 - You will also get RESULTS: 77 clients freed and counting!
- Are there any prerequisites?
 - You must have completed the first year of law school.
 - The State Bar currently requires you to be enrolled in Evidence during fall of second year.
 - That is likely to change, very soon.
 - You must attend a two-day orientation the week before school begins:
 - Almost always on Wednesday and Thursday
- Grades are not the most important thing in the JIFS Clinic commitment is.
 - You have to be there for your client.
 - You have to support your fellow clinic members and members of your defense team.
 - You have to function as a lawyer.
